

"The first law of nature is to love."

It would have been easy to pursue revenge and to harbor hatred after losing his brother in Liberia's civil war. However, Victor Garpulee did not follow that path. His love for people had the upper hand, and he chose instead to promote peace in his community by educating youth. If we wish to experience peace, he believes we must "build together as brothers and sisters." At the end of the day, "we are people, and we are interconnected," Victor says, and "...together we can make it better."

As founder of Volunteering for Peace in Palestine, a non-profit organization dedicated to interfaith and intercultural bridge building among Palestinian youth, Tareg al-Tamimi has committed his life to peace-building. To celebrate this year's International Day of Peace, VFP in Palestine organized a roundtable discussion, where those involved discussed what peace looks like. Many yearned to live at least one day in real peace. Tareg sees the importance of collaboration in order to achieve this goal and values his membership in Euphrates.

Peacebuilding is not an easy feat. Often it requires sacrifice and moral courage, but those involved are mission-driven and deeply committed. Abdul Ismail has chosen to promote peace through the use of education in an area where ISIS is aggressively recruiting young people. Describing the danger of ignorance, he says, "Our community in general does not know about the West. We only know about it through media and Hollywood movies, which show the West as a land of gangs, drugs and violence. Our community believes the Christian West hates the Muslims, and no good comes from this belief. Simply

put, our community in general does not know the West. This is why ISIS has the chance to recruit innocent young people." Abdul believes that addressing these misconceptions will aid in the effort to halt terrorism, and he is committed to this mission for peace.



LISTENING IS AT THE HEART OF PEACEBUILDING

LEN & LIBBY TRAUBMAN

Pioneers of Grassroots Peacebuilding
Founders of the Jewish-Palestinian Living Room Dialogue

"Who are you? Tell me your story."

Len and Libby Traubman have devoted their lives to asking this question, listening deeply and compassionately to the response, and encouraging others to do the same. They believe strongly in the importance of listening to one another's stories, even to those of our so-called enemies.

Their journey spans decades. In 1969, seeing the image of Earth from outer space for the first time, they were awestruck by the idea that "We are One,"



all sharing the same planet, which inspired them to "think globally, act locally." They helped found the successful Beyond War Movement, "insisting that all conflict be resolved without violence—no bombing, and for us no spanking." In the 1980s, amidst the Cold War,



they were invited on a trip to the Soviet Union where they learned that "conflict resolution begins with first knowing the other human being."

Len and Libby later founded the Jewish-Palestinian Living Room Dialogue, which began

25 years ago and is still going strong, **Listening** with more than 600 is a great meetings to date. With act of their own community of Muslims, Jews and Christians in San Mateo. California, the couple hosted the Bay-Area Dinner Dialogue for 420 Palestinians and Jews. In partnership with Camp Tawonga, a Jewish summer camp near Yosemite, they co-created the

first Palestinian-Jewish Family Peacemaker camp, bringing together youth and adults from over fifty towns in Israel and Palestine.

Believing in the innate interconnectedness we have with one another, Len and Libby see

the purpose of dialogue as helping the participants feel and experience this oneness. Try it out for yourself. Live after Len and Libby's model. Practice the act of listening. Give a voice to the so-called

"Other." Hear their story. Doing this naturally has a ripple effect, and it supports the vision so many of us have - to see a world at peace.




